Hot tips to keep cool

Did you know that you use three to five percent more energy for each degree that your air conditioner is set below 75 degrees Fahrenheit?

HERE ARE SOME WAYS TO KEEP COOL THIS SUMMER WITHOUT BOOSTING YOUR UTILITY BILL:

- A programmable thermostat saves energy and money by running a scheduled program and allows you to avoid manual changes.
- Turn off your air conditioner before you leave home for an extended period of time. Or at least turn up the thermostat.
- Ceiling fans use less electricity than air conditioners or furnaces. Turn off ceiling fans when you're not in the room. Remember, fans cool people, not rooms.
- Opening windows in the summer mornings and evenings costs nothing, but it can save on energy.
- Heat up the food, not the house. A microwave is much more efficient at heating things up than an oven.
- Engage a qualified HVAC firm in a maintenance contract with seasonal tune-ups. During these tune-ups, a technician should check combustion efficiency, refrigerant charge, and belt tension as applicable.
- Replace air filters regularly. Accumulated dirt and dust make your fans work harder. Clean or replace filters as recommended by your system's manufacturer.

Sprinkler system checkup

During the summer, sprinkler systems are used more often, which increases the risk for failures in the different components. A broken nozzle, sprinkler head, or underground pipe could waste thousands of gallons of water in one month.

To make sure you're not wasting water, perform a visual inspection of all irrigation zones on a regular basis. Run each irrigation zone for three to five minutes to make sure the equipment is operating properly and to adjust the spray areas. And remember to replace your controller battery regularly to ensure your irrigation cycles continue to run smoothly.

For customers with an underground irrigation system, the City offers a \$75 rebate to help offset the cost of having their controller box inspected and set to the recommended specifications by a licensed irrigator. The City also offers three rebates for customers to improve the efficiency of their irrigation systems. Customers can receive up to \$150 in rebates for each of the following programs: changing their irrigation system from a spray system to a drip system, converting spray nozzles to multi-stream nozzles, or installing a wi-fi enabled "smart" controller to help irrigation systems run more efficiently.

As a reminder to all customers, Monday is **#NoWateringMonday**, a recovery day for the water treatment, storage, and distribution system.
