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Downtown Master Plan Update

An update of the Downtown Master Plan is now underway to account for development since 2003, revisit the original goals and framework of the plan, and consider new ideas. A public involvement process on the Downtown Master Plan update started in August and will continue through February 2014.

Adopted 10 years ago, the Downtown Master Plan is the City's guiding framework for new development and redevelopment in the Downtown Overlay District. The plan guides street and streetscape projects, wayfinding signs, and new development.

Public projects since 2003 include the Courthouse renovation, the new public library on Eighth Street, public artwork on the Square, and pedestrian or streetscape projects on Austin Avenue, Main Street, and Church Street. New commercial development includes Tamiro Plaza, Monument Café, El Monumento, the Gold's building, Quenan's Jewelry, and town homes on Main Street.

Mosquito Control Effort Targets West Nile Risk

This summer, the City of Georgetown and the Williamson County and Cities Health District began collaborating on a new targeted effort to reduce the risk from mosquitos that carry West Nile virus. The joint initiative is the first of its kind in Williamson County.

Mosquitos from six locations are trapped each week by a City of Georgetown employee and transported by Health District employees to the Texas Department of State Health Services lab in Austin. The weekly testing continues through the summer.

The City also is using larvicide disks in drainage ponds and other areas with standing water to kill mosquito larvae before they hatch to the adult insect.

In the past, the City's transportation department sprayed a pesticide to kill adult mosquitos in public parks and, years ago, in residential areas. The new mosquito trapping and testing program developed in the past year is targeted to identify areas with mosquitos that carry the West Nile virus.

If mosquitos from an area test positive for the virus, additional steps can be taken, such as searches for stand-

> ing water, increased use of larvicides, or additional public information about reducing breeding areas and the risk of exposure. If testing shows significantly increased exposure risk to the West Nile virus, then groundbased pesticide fogging or aerial pesticide spraying can be considered.

This program is only one element in reducing the risk from West Nile virus. Residents play an important role and can "Fight the Bite" by draining water from flower pots or other reservoirs, dressing in long pants and sleeves when outdoors, reducing outside activity at dusk or dawn, and using DEET bug spray.
