Live Music: Minnie and Ella Jordan will perform in the Live Music at the Library series on Sunday, May 15, at 2 p.m. Minnie and Ella play swing, hot jazz, and standards from the '20s and '30s. They sing and play fiddle, guitar, tenor guitar, and mandolin. Free and open to the public, this performance is a gift of the Friends of the Georgetown Public Library.

Art: Georgetown ISD Student Art Exhibit at the Library is May 4 – 16, with an opening reception Wednesday, May 4 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Waterloo Watercolor Group Exhibit is May 20 – July 1, with an opening reception Friday, April 1 from 4 to 6 p.m.

Kids: May will feature an interactive Children's Concert in conjunction with the Georgetown Festival of the Arts on Friday, May 13 at 10:30 a.m. There also is a celebration for Dr. Seuss with a puppet show and crafts on Saturday, May 21 at 2 p.m. Both events are free and open to all ages.

Dr. Seuss Wants You! An exhibit featuring the WWII political cartoons of Theodor Seuss Geisel, aka Dr. Seuss, along with Seuss memorabilia from the mid-20th century, will be on display at the Library April 29 – May 25. Through his illustrations, and later in his popular children's books, he looked at discrimination, bigotry, and persecution. The exhibit is presented by Congregation Havurah Shalom of Sun City. In addition, Seuss memorabilia will be on loan courtesy of the Gregg and Michelle Phillipson Collection and Archive. The exhibit is open to the public during library hours. It is appropriate for all ages and admission is free.



The Red Handkerchief author lecture: Yvonne Ward-Hughes, author of The Red Handkerchief, will give a public talk at the Library on Sunday, May 1 at 2 p.m. At age 19, Yvonne Ward-Hughes' mother, Maria Spronk-Hughes, and Maria's 20-year-old sister Catharina Spronk-DeVries, joined a resistance group in Amsterdam and performed acts of sabotage against the Nazis. Three years later, they were arrested by the Gestapo and sent to a Nazi prison and then to the Vught concentration camp. In 1944, they were put on trial by the Nazis for sabotage. The Red Handkerchief is based on their story. The author will speak

about her mother's and aunt's experiences and moral courage. Maria, who is now 94, will be available to answer questions and sign copies of the book. The free talk commemorates the Holocaust Day of Remembrance and is sponsored by Congregation Havurah Shalom of Sun City.

Xeriscaping

Adding xeriscape elements to your lawn can reduce yard maintenance time, add beauty to your home, and help you save on water. Native or drought-resistant plants such as Crape myrtle, bottlebrush, oleander, rosemary, esperanza, mimosa, bird of paradise, and lantanas perform well in our climate. Dress planting beds or walkways with native stone, river gravel, or decomposed crushed granite. Automatic irrigation may be eliminated in some areas or converted to drip irrigation. HVAC Maintenance

The heating, ventilating, and air-conditioning system in your home is one of the biggest energy users each month—especially in the summertime. Here are some ways to help your HVAC system last longer and reduce your monthly bill.

- **Install a programmable thermostat.** This helps you to set your air conditioner to a warmer temperature when leaving the home, then begin cooling a half-hour before you are due to return.
- Schedule regular maintenance. Tuning up your cooling system each spring and your heating system each fall will help ensure each operates at peak efficiency.
- Change your air filters. Experts recommend changing your filters every thirty days. A dirty filter decreases the efficiency of your HVAC system and creates a serious fire hazard.
- Add shade for your A/C. An A/C compressor or window unit that is shaded by an
 awning or tree can operate more efficiently and cut your energy costs by as much
 as 10 percent. Also make sure that the air flow is not restricted by any debris,
 enclosures, or shrubs.

Household Hazardous Waste Vouchers

Doing some spring cleaning in the garage? Use a voucher from the City of Georgetown to safely dispose of household hazards like cans of paint or varnish, CFL light bulbs, batteries, and pesticides.

The vouchers allow residential customers with the City of Georgetown solid waste service with active accounts to dispose of household hazards at the Williamson County Recycle Center at 495 CR 156, which is northeast of Georgetown on FM 971. (Materials cannot be from a personal home business, nor a commercial account.)

Vouchers cover 100 percent disposal costs for in-City customers and 50 percent of disposal costs for out-of-City solid waste customers. One voucher per household may be requested every three months. Vouchers are redeemable for 14 days. Obtain a voucher in-person at Customer Care, Georgetown Municipal Complex, 300-1 Industrial Avenue or at the Collection Station, 250 W.L. Walden Drive. Bring a recent City of Georgetown utility bill and/or a photo ID. For details go to recycle.georgetown.org or call Customer Care at (512) 930-3640.
