The ballot for Georgetown City Council races in the May 6 election includes candidates for mayor, District 2, and District 6. Incumbent Mayor Dale Ross and Sherwin Kahn are on the ballot for the mayor's race. Valerie Nicholson and David Sray are running for the District 2 seat and incumbent Rachael Jonrowe and Lawrence Romero are on the ballot for District 6.

Managing Your Utility Bills

The beautiful spring and summer months in Central Texas come at a price from increased water and electricity usage due to rising temperatures. Georgetown Utility Systems has tools to help you manage these costs and adjust your usage so there are no surprises on your utility bill.

Georgetown Utilities Analysis and Reporting Doorway is available 24/7 and can be accessed from your computer. When you sign up for GUARD, you can set monetary thresholds for your electric consumption. For instance, if you set a threshold for \$100, GUARD will send you an email and text message letting you know when you've reached that amount.

AquaAlerts works the same way for water consumption. This is especially helpful during the summer months when many folks have increased water usage due to irrigation and other outside activities.

Yard Trimmings Collections

For in-city residents, yard trimmings are picked up along with your first recycle pickup of the month. Material must be in bundles, personal containers labeled as "yard trimmings," or compostable Kraft paper bags that are available at local hardware and grocery stores. Each bundle should be no more than four feet in length and no more than 35 pounds and secured with twine. The maximum number of items per pickup is 20, including any combination of Kraft paper bags, personal containers, or bundles. Look up your collection days at recycle.georgetown.org.



Williams Drive Corridor Study

Last year the City partnered with the Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization to study Williams Drive between Austin Avenue and Jim Hogg Road. The study includes an implementation plan incorporating safety, efficient transportation operations, land use, community needs, and future economic growth.

The first phase of the study identified five primary issues: traffic congestion, traffic operations, barriers to redevelopment and reinvestment, aesthetic enhancements, and pedestrian/bicycle facilities. Conceptual plans presented at an Open House on March 9 define the vision for Williams Drive and recommend future actions.
