One-day-a-week watering now in effect

Due to sustained high water use nearing system treatment capacity, the City of Georgetown has enacted Stage 2 of the Drought Contingency Plan, which restricts watering with an irrigation system or hose-end sprinkler to one day per week. Watering with an irrigation system is not permitted at all on Mondays or from noon to 7 p.m. on any day. Watering with a handheld hose or bucket can be done any day and at any time. Washing a vehicle is only permitted at

a commercial car wash. Violations of the irrigation schedule may result in administrative charges on customer bills.

Sales tax election | NOV. 8

Georgetown residents can vote to renew the street maintenance sales tax in the Nov. 8 election.

Revenue from the 0.25 percent City sales tax is dedicated to resurfacing and repair work on City streets. The sales tax will generate an estimated \$6.5 million in 2022.

The street network in Georgetown has more than doubled in the last 20 years from about 400 lane miles in 2002 to nearly 1,000 lane miles in 2022.

Prepare for a hurricane before it happens

While hurricane season is typically June through November, the peak of the season is August through October. While a typical heavy thunderstorm may bring a few inches of rain, some hurricanes can dump several feet on an area. Rain from a tropical system can reach hundreds of miles inland, and flood warnings may occur very far from the eye of a storm. Along the Gulf of Mexico and eastern United States, rainfall from hurricanes makes up about 10-15 percent of the total annual rainfall. Evaluate what you need to do to protect your home and family before a storm hits. Find out how to prepare at **hurricanes.gov/prepare**.

Water rate changes

The City has been working with consultants NewGen Strategies and Solutions to complete a cost-of-service rate study to determine the rates and rate structure needed to equitably fund the water utility.

According to the analysis, the City will need to raise all customer rates for water and wastewater to ensure we have enough revenue to cover the costs of operating the utility and to meet our regulatory targets and requirements. Once approved by City Council as part of the budgeting process, new rates will go into effect Oct. 1, 2022.

Water rates were last adjusted for residential customers in 2020. Nonresidential water rates were changed in 2019. Sewer rates were updated for all customers in 2019. For more information about the rate study, visit https://gus.georgetown.org/water/2022-water-and-wastewater-rate-study.
