## City budget focused maintaining service levels

Major themes of the proposed budget are investments in transportation and utility infrastructure, public safety, and customer services, as well as building the infrastructure needed to keep pace with growth, responding to development pressures, and retaining and recruiting high-caliber employees.

The adopted budget totals \$868 million and keeps the City's property tax rate at 37.4 cents per \$100 valuation. The proposed tax rate was expected to be approved Sept. 26. (This newsletter was printed Sept. 18.) The City's rate is among the lowest of all cities in the Austin area with a population greater than 20,000. By keeping the rate at 37.4 cents per \$100 of valuation and with increasing property values, the average property tax bill is expected to increase by about \$125 per year, or \$10.42 a month.

Following a solid waste and a water and wastewater rate study, Georgetown residents and customers can expect solid waste, water, and wastewater rates to increase, as well. The budget includes a proposed solid waste rate increase of 4.5 percent for residential customers, or about \$0.98 per month, and 9.5 percent for commercial users. Water and wastewater rates are projected to increase 13 percent for all customer types, or approximately \$6 a month for a family using 6,000 gallons of water per month.

## Cease the grease this holiday

The holiday season can be a pain for your pipes and drains, especially when it comes to fats, oils, and grease used for cooking. When fat, oil, and grease are poured down the drain, it can lead to clogged pipes and sewage backups. Do not to pour cooking oil and meat fats into the kitchen sink or toilet or put food scraps down the garbage disposal. Instead, please properly dispose of your used cooking oils and fats by using paper towels to remove residual grease or oil from dishes, pots, and pans before washing. Pour cooled cooking oil and meat fats in sealed containers and dispose in your garbage. Larger amounts of fryer grease, including oil used to fry turkeys, can be disposed of at the Transfer Station, 250 W.L. Walden Drive, for no charge.

## Make your holiday fireproof

Cooking is the main cause of home fires and fire injuries, and Thanksgiving is the peak day for cooking-related fires. You can prevent cooking fires. Take these steps to keep your family safe:



- Use caution when frying a turkey: Only fry them outdoors on a sturdy, level surface, well away from things that can burn, and only fry a thawed turkey.
- Stand by your pan: If you leave the kitchen, turn the burner off.
- Watch what you are cooking: Fires start when the heat is too high. If you see any smoke or the grease starts to boil, turn the burner off.
- Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove: Then no one can bump them or pull them over.
- Keep a pan lid or baking sheet nearby: Use it to cover the pan if it catches on fire.
