During the event with a donation to ROCK, Ride On Center for Kids, residents will be able to drop off paper for shredding (limit three boxes or sacks), tires (limit four), mattresses, furniture (in good condition), household appliances (no refrigerators), electronics, and used crayons. Household hazardous and medical waste items will not be accepted.

Springtime can bring flooding: Sign up for emergency alerts

Floods are the most common natural disaster in the United States. Floods can develop slowly or quickly, and may come with no warning. Prepare now for your household, including your pets, to protect yourself from flooding. Learn more about how to prepare for a flood, as well as what to do during and after a flood at ready.gov/floods.

If you are under a flood warning, find safe shelter right away. Do not walk, swim, or drive through flood waters. Turn Around, Don't Drown! Just six inches of moving water can knock you down and one foot of moving water can sweep your vehicle away. Visit wilco.org/wxmap for up-to-date closed low-water crossings.

Be sure to register to receive emergency notifications from your local emergency response team. Be among the first to receive critical community alerts regarding natural disasters, weather warnings, evacuation notices, and boil water notices. Register to get emergency warnings by email, text, or phone at WarnCentralTexas.org.
